Non-Formal Schools Benefit from Equipment Assistance



Children from Brabowan Village, Gayam District, Bojonegoro Regency now enjoy a more comfortable learning environment at their nearby non-formal school.

Non-formal education is mostly carried out by private sectors and individuals, so many have not yet been touched by assistance from others.

Siti Meisyaroh was touched when the aid transport vehicle from ExxonMobil Cepu Limited (EMCL) arrived. A whiteboard and a set of desks were unloaded and arranged in the classroom. Her eyes filled with tears as she saw the madrasah her father had started nearly 20 years ago, now looking even better with new classroom equipment.

Nineteen other schools felt the same way. Non-formal schools in 20 villages in Bojonegoro and Tuban simultaneously received this aid. The aid was distributed based on the priorities of the district government and recommendations from the local government.

Most of the aid recipients are in villages near EMCL's operations in the Banyu Urip Oil Field and Kedung Keris. This aid complements government efforts to enhance the quality of education in both formal and non-formal sectors. •

How Agricultural Field School Changed the Perspectives of Farmers in Brabowan



Lasmidi has harvested more rice than before, after consistently practicing environmentally-friendly farming for the past two years.

The farming community of Brabowan Village, Gayam District, Bojonegoro Regency, has now embraced environmentally-friendly ecological farming practices. They have found benefits in this method as it helps reduce production costs and improve soil productivity.

Previously, Lasmidi heavily relied on chemical fertilizers and pesticides. After adopting environmentally-friendly ecological farming methods, he now addresses fertilizer scarcity by making his own. All fertilizer materials can be sourced and managed independently, including effective pest control without chemicals.

According to a farmer from Brabo hamlet in Brabowan Village, their ancestors originally practiced environmentally-friendly methods. However, due to the widespread use of chemical fertilizers, many farmers became complacent and dependent on factory-made fertilizers and pesticides. In contrast, ecological farming methods allow farmers to make their own fertilizers using inexpensive and readily available materials. Natural predators also assist in pest control in this approach.

This knowledge would have been impossible for Lasmidi to understand if he had not joined the Agricultural Field School (SLP) initiated by ExxonMobil Cepu Limited (EMCL) in collaboration with Yayasan Daun Bendera (FIELD Indonesia). Since 2020, over 600 farmers from six villages in Gayam District and two villages in Kalitidu District, Bojonegoro Regency, have participated in the program and adopted environmentally-friendly methods. The SLP initiative has led to the creation of a new agricultural ecosystem. The hope is that farmers can become more self-sufficient and prosperous. •

Local Contractors Continue Learning, Growing More Professional and Competitive

Many local suppliers around the Banyu Urip Field operations are rapidly developing and advancing. The key is continuous learning, including participating in Competency Enhancement and Vendor Understanding Training in Procurement Aspects at ExxonMobil Cepu Limited (EMCL).



Domestic Content Level (TKDN) Calculation and Procurement Procedures within EMCL are the main topics of discussion in this 25th training session.

Welly Fitratama, Head of the Bojonegoro District Industry and Manpower Office, emphasizes that local contractors must continue learning. Every opportunity should be seized to enhance management capacity and focus on developing competitive advantages. One such opportunity is participating in training organized by the government and companies, such as those conducted by ExxonMobil Cepu Limited (EMCL).

EMCL recently held Training for Local Contractors in Bojonegoro District, with one of the themes focusing on Domestic Content Level (TKDN) calculations. This topic discusses the company's compliance with government regulations governing the use of domestic products and services.

"This is crucial for local business players to understand and master how to calculate TKDN," said Welly in front of 61 participants from 51 local contractors in Bojonegoro and Tuban.

Welly's statement was reinforced by Febrian Ihsan, Head of the Formalities and Communication Department at SKK Migas Jabanusa. According to him, SKK Migas encourages all Production Sharing Contract (KKKS) contractors in the upstream oil and gas industry to open opportunities for local contractors to partner with a professional foundation and suitable competencies. •

Mukhlas is a well-known name among the drilling teams. Whenever there's a drilling project, he always plays a crucial role, including in the Banyu Urip Infill & Clustic (BUIC) drilling project.

Forty-two years old, Mukhlas never imagined having a career in drilling. Even during college, he pursued a degree in law. After graduating, he was active in social activities and advocacy work.

However, life can take unexpected turns. More than 14 years ago, his life changed. The young man from Bojonegoro got involved in preparing socio-economic materials for the Banyu Urip Field development project.

During this social study, he became familiar with the upstream oil and gas industry players at the Banyu Urip Oil Field. Due to his skills and performance, Mukhlas was asked to work on supporting drilling projects.

From then on, he learned about drilling and the oil and gas industry. Eventually, he managed a workforce of over 150 employees for the BUIC project. His workshop in Gayam Village is always busy, and he has even become an importer of technical oil and gas equipment. ▪

Government and Company Collaboration Key to Disaster Management

The Banyu Urip Field Safety Workshop serves as a platform for the government and companies to align perceptions, train together, and foster continuous cooperation in disaster management.

ExxonMobil Cepu Limited (EMCL) and SKK Migas initiated the upstream oil and gas industry safety workshop with the Regional Disaster Management Agency (BPBD) of Tuban Regency, district heads along the Banyu Urip Field pipeline route, and the Environmental Agency of Tuban Regency at the end of May. This focused discussion addressed emergency preparedness along the Banyu Urip Field pipeline route and the Floating Storage and Offloading (FSO) Gagak Rimang.

Sudarmaji, Head of Tuban Regency BPBD, presented disaster mitigation plans, disaster concepts, and safety procedures within Tuban Regency. Similar presentations were delivered by EMCL representatives as operators of the Banyu Urip Field and the Port Authority (KSOP) of Tanjung Pakis regarding offshore emergency management. Each entity sought multi-stakeholder integration for synergy and ongoing collaboration. •
